### 1 John 5:1-6

Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ has been born of God, and everyone who loves the parent loves the child. <sup>2</sup>By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God and obey his commandments. <sup>3</sup>For the love of God is this, that we obey his commandments. And his commandments are not burdensome, <sup>4</sup>for whatever is born of God conquers the world. And this is the victory that conquers the world, our faith. <sup>5</sup>Who is it that conquers the world but the one who believes that Jesus is the Son of God? <sup>6</sup>This is the one who came by water and blood, Jesus Christ, not with the water only but with the water and the blood. And the Spirit is the one that testifies, for the Spirit is the truth.

<u>John 15:9-17</u>  ${}^{9}$ As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love.  ${}^{10}$ If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. <sup>11</sup>I have said these things to you so that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be complete. <sup>12</sup>"This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. <sup>13</sup>No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. <sup>14</sup>You are my friends if you do what I command you. 15I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father. <sup>16</sup>You did not choose me but I chose you. And I appointed you to go and bear fruit, fruit that will last, so that the Father will give you whatever you ask him in my name.  $^{17}I$  am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.

Today we celebrate the mothers who brought forth our lives, the women who are spiritual mothers, who mentor others, and all the daughters. Amen!

We also celebrate this 6<sup>th</sup> week of Easter, and what we will know is that Easter is not a one-day event. It is a continuous process in which we are recognizing that that one day is a day that continues to give us hope.

And it is after Easter that we're getting an opportunity to see how Jesus revealed himself to the disciples. That was important because today we may read the Bible and understand the resurrection, but that was a new thing for them. You might say, "Well, there was Lazarus...." But when you see what it is that Jesus endured on that cross—and then he's dead, and he's buried, and he's resurrected, and then he shows himself in the resurrected body—it gives you hope to keep on.

As we celebrate Mother's Day, we know that it isn't just the day you gave birth. It's the travailing and the joy that came forth as the baby was born, and continues, and continues, and continues. (Brothers, if the sisters won't say Amen, I need you to say Amen!) Love is a wonderful thing...but it's not a one-day event: Good times, bad times, happy times, sad times! There are some times when there are three folks crying in the room at the same time—the mama, the daddy, and a baby. The baby won't quit crying, and you don't know whether to feed, or to burp, or what! It is just a continuous process and not a one-day event.

There are times that we get to go back and recognize things that were done, could have been done differently, and make that a part of the healing process. What we need to understand is that we serve a relational God. It isn't just enough for God to sit high and look low, and as we learned in seminary, just to be the immovable God. No, this relational God understands that relationships in a family are a way for us to better understand God's love, to better understand how it is that we are to relate with each other.

We serve a relational God. It is also important for us to understand that reconciliation recognizes that broken things need to be repaired. It is not just enough that Jesus reconciled us to God; that's a vertical thing. But there's a reconciliation that takes place from human being to human being. In our families there are times when reconciliation needs to take place. Imperfect people amongst imperfect people will lead to imperfect situations. And so reconciliation is not just about a one-day thing that Jesus did. It is because he reconciled us unto God that we can be reconciled unto others, and we live out what it is that we have experienced with God through Jesus Christ.

The other thing is we need to be reminded that redemption was not just about paying the price just once. The blood, the atonement that Christ did—it's a continuous process. A continuous process. I lift that up because there are some situations in our lives that need to be redeemed. You say there's a debt, there's a gulf, and I can't get past it, I'm stuck. Well, I invite you to invite Jesus to come and to redeem the situation. Why? Because he's already done it in Glory. So why shouldn't we allow it to become our reality here on Earth? Allow him to come and redeem some situation and say "Baby, you know what, that wasn't right. It shouldn't have been done that way. Will you allow me to take the debt that you've been carrying so that you can be free? Will you allow me to take that upon me?" But they deserve worse—they deserve.... "No, baby. If you continue to do that, you won't be free. Will you allow me to take the debt they owe you? Will you allow me to take it? Will you allow me to take the anguish, the pain, the hate—all you have—and allow me to have it so I can redeem it, so you can live a liberated life?" A relational God brings about reconciliation, moving forward for redeeming situations that are difficult in our lives.

I want you to know that Jesus was so compelled to do this that even from the cross—it talks about all that the guards had done—but even from the cross he looked down to his mother with his sisters, and he said to her, "Woman," as he looks to John the Beloved, "your son," and then he looks to John, "Son, behold, your mother." See, Jesus was already trying to repair a breach. He's gone. Mom needs someone to care and love her, and who does he entrust? John. And the text will let you know that from that moment on, John took over the care for his mother. It's important; relationships are important.

As we look at the text, you say "James, what does all that have to do with the text?" It's an expression of love. Love is more than just what we use on Valentine's Day to buy roses and to get some chocolate and some gifts. Love is more than eros—you know, that mmm feeling you get when you see someone special—more than that. It's more than that brotherly love, that love you know with homeboys, that "ace boon coon"....No, it's agapeo love, love you to the depth. When I don't want to be with you, I still love you. When I want to be with you and don't want to be away from you, I love you. When we're going in the same direction, I love you. When it seems like we can't do anything but miscue with each other, I love you. When you're where you ought to be and do what you ought to be doing, I love you; and when you don't and you're not, I love you. You see, that's the kind of love that God has for us, and that is the love that you're hearing about in this text.

As you hear in *1 John*, Jesus says, "Everyone who believes Jesus is the Christ has been born of God," and that's a powerful thing. Who gives us the capacity to believe God? Who gives us the choice to believe God? And then what he says is, if you choose to, and when you do, something incredible happens. There's a transformation that takes place in your life. And some people say that it happens instantly.

That's why we had folks who could give us money so we can create bags so that we can give to people who are in need. That's why we have a group of people who go out as a part of Mobile Loaves & Fishes. That is why we have folks who will go to Sudan, go to Cuba, go to Chiapas, go to other areas of the world—so that we handle things *globally*, we handle things *regionally*, and we also do things *locally*.

And I choose to believe that we love each other because every one of you know that you could be at another church where it could be a whole lot easier. Somebody would be singing the songs you once heard, the preacher would stay with the text, the order would always stay right there and be decent and in order. But love is when we bear each other up, knowing that none of us is perfect and every one of us needs a time with someone who will say, "I know your mess, but I love you anyhow, and I'm with you; I'm with you until the end." Amen.

And so those things were important, but I also love this part, and I know we're worrying about war and battles and all this, but hear this part that says "For the love of God is this, that we obey his commandments. And his commandments are not burdensome." I said, "Well, I don't know about that one because there's been some times that I said 'Well, should I? Could I?'—and the burden was released when I said "Yes." Now, I didn't know how the outcome was going to be because normally it's going to tell you to do the very opposite of what you want to do, or what everyone else is doing, and that's enough to cause some issues in the inside where it does feel like a burden. But when you finally say "Yes" and you finally say "Whoo" and go, and you watch things start to come together, you're like "Okay, yeah, I like this thing. I now understand a little bit better." Yet the next time comes, and you're back to the place of "I don't know about this, Lord. I'm trying to do the right thing, but evil is always present. The spirit is willing but my flesh is weak." But when we do it continuously, it is not as much of a burden because it becomes a natural process, a natural way in which we act, and we do, and we believe, and we trust.

But this other part, and ya'll know the athlete in me, it says that we conquer. There are some things that we get to overcome because of what Christ has done.

- Fears: <u>False Evidence Appearing Real</u>. Why can I think I can overcome my fears?
- Remember these words from 2 Timothy, and it says, "The Lord has not given us a spirit of fear but of love and power and of sound mind."
- Only 10% of the things we fear actually ever happen. We get to running around like chickens with our heads chopped off over stuff that 90% of the time will not happen.
- Fear: Follow after these principles.. Love, mercy, grace, and forgiving others.

I can get to a place—and I'm still working on some things as it is a journey—but some forgiving as I start practicing it and working it out. "You know what, I've been good today, Lord. I conquered that." And He says, "Well, that is good for today, but what about tomorrow?" We're gonna try with Your help.

But there are some things we could conquer. Well, how is it that you do it so you continue to stay in the Word? You continue to live out these principles that mean so much because they make a difference; they make a difference in how we can overcome, and we can do anything because the victory is already won. Now it's just a matter of our living it out so that others can experience it. Some would say, "How do you know it?" Because he gave us life. He came by water and blood. And he did

Pastor James H. Lee May 10, 2015-6th Sunday of Easter Mother's Day

We celebrate the baptism because of the fact that he aligned himself with us; and we celebrate talking about the blood piece, not only in his humanity but the atoning sacrifices that he made for our sake. And I love the fact that it says that the Holy Spirit is the one that will testify to the truth. When I said "what is this" early on, it's talking about the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit that rests, rules, and abides with us, and is that one who testifies to the truth that he is there with us.

But here is another thing that I needed us to hear in the Gospel reading. We hear Jesus telling his disciples that he wants them to abide in him and he will abide in them. The difference. I want us to think about abiding. I know I've said it once before, and I'll say it again: Is there a difference between a hotel and a house? You check into a hotel and you check out. But if it's your house, it's your home and you abide there. Jesus wants us to abide, stay there. And Jesus will not check out. As a thing about the Lord saying you abide with Me, I'm abiding with you—We check out, but God hasn't, and God is with us. He even gave us a promise: "I'll never leave you nor forsake you." Even in the Great Commission He says, "Lo, I'll be with you until the very ends of the day." He wants them to hear again the importance of abiding: "As the father has loved me so I love you, and I want you to abide in this love, and if you keep my commandments you will abide in me."

That's another thing, a lot of the times when I get mad at God it is because I'm wondering, "Why, God, haven't You done what You're supposed to do?-It's because somebody didn't do what he was supposed to do. Now you could say, "Well, James, you played with that "if." Yeah, you're right, and I did because there are some principles behind that. There are some things that we need to do because they're the right things for us to do. Instead of doing our own thing and then getting upset at God for us having to deal with our mess or try to justify it. We're good at it. We can wordsmith better than anybody. But God didn't call us to wordsmith; God called us to obey. Obey. And I know some will say, "Well, I can find somewhere in the Scriptures where it tells you to do something crazy, and it doesn't match up." That isn't where we're focusing. I always like to say follow the rules. Quit jumping after the exception and letting the exception be the rule. What is consistently across the base? What are their principles, what are these principles saying? And if that is consistent, stay with that. Stay with it. The faithfulness of God is there; the love of God continues to abide. But stick with that.

I love the fact that in *1 John* it says that it is not a burden, and then Jesus says, "I'm telling you guys this so that my joy and your joy may be complete." It didn't feel like that in the beginning, but he's really saying, "I want your joy to be complete, and my joy is complete when you do it." When you do it, it is something. Have you ever tried to do something that was so very hard, and when you finally did it, you looked up, and that "aha" moment was something brilliant and it blew you away, and you're like "You know, I can do this thing." And Jesus is saying,





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And then I love this other thing. Jesus says, "I'm going to call you by another name." Now I've been called out of my name. I've been called by my name, but I love this piece when Jesus says, "No longer do I call you doulos, slave, servant...I call you a friend." I almost had us singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" and "I Am a Friend of God"—"Who am I that Thou art mindful of me?" Jesus says you are my friend because you know what it is that I've come to do and what I want to do in and through you, because doulos, a servant, a slave doesn't know what the plan is.





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One might say, "Well, if Paul says he is a doulos, then what's the difference between this doulos and what Jesus is talking about?" Paul was saying that "I am such a committed servant to the Lord that I've got the 'I can't help myself's." Anybody in the house got the "I can't help myself's sometimes?" Like why are you doing that? The church is here, and you're doing this and you're doing that? And you say, "I'm compelled." Folks on the session they had to kick me out of the pulpit. I was just compelled; it's good for you, and I was compelled. They said, "No, you need to be propelled out of here." Sometimes we need others to help us for our own best good. Amen.

Last piece: I love this last part, verse 16. "You did not choose me but I chose you." Did you get it? Need to say it reals low... "You did not choose me but I chose you." You didn't even have to be the last in the line. He said "I choose you." Wasn't worried about Bubba, wasn't worried about Bob, wasn't worried about Suzy, and Joe, and Josephine. God knew your name and said "I choose you." I need you to know you're chosen by God. You're called by God, and you can choose to say "Yes" or "No," but know that you're called and you're chosen. You're not a mistake. You are a blessing, and God is pleased. And I want you to know your names are written on the hands of Almighty God! Can you imagine how many names are there and God knows you intimately? Knows the number of hairs that are upon your head (and in my case the ones that have left and have turned gray). But God is that kind of a God. Amen.

Finally, the last part, "I appointed you to go." To sit in the four walls? No, to go. To stay around and debate and to read and to discuss? No, go. And then what? "To bear fruit that will last so that the father will give you whatever you ask in my name. I'm giving you these commandments so that you will love one another. I appointed you to bear fruit." And again, if Jesus is the vine and you are a branch, a branch can't do anything but what? Bear the fruit. You don't have to do anything extra. Just bear, just be. Let it flow. Well, how does that happen? I let the Lord do what God does, and I quit doing what I do. Because ya'll know when we do this stuff that we crimp up the branch; the load just kills the flow. The Lord says, "Baby, just abide in me and let me abide in you. Just let me flow so I can bear some fruit for you." Amen?!

So as we leave, know that you may have said "Yes," but God chose you just to know that God appointed you to bear fruit that will last. No strings attached, and it's something that happens from above, so nobody can take credit for it but God; and nobody can separate you from the love of God because it's a God thing. And who testifies to what has taken place here? The Spirit. It's a good thing.

Let's pray. Lord, thank you for our time. Thank you for your love. Thank you that it's more than just a word, more than an expression. It was lived through Christ who lived and died for our sake. Lord, help us to love one another as you commanded us to do. We know how difficult it is, and you knew how difficult it would be, so you told us to allow your Spirit to abide in us. And you also told the disciples, "Wait until you will receive power. And then you can be the witness of me in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and the othermost parts of the world." So we ask for your help, ask that your grace may abound; your mercies may continue to be new for us each morning; that you would bless our families; that you bless our neighborhoods; that you bless our nation; that you will bless our world through other saints who also were called and appointed to bear fruit. It's to the glory of Christ we pray. Amen.







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
