

New Covenant Fellowship of Austin November 5th, 2017: All Saints' Day

Ugly crying....The act of ugly crying has become a part of my weekly rhythm. All thanks to the TV show "This is Us." I know there are a few fellow fans of the show in this church, so some of you know what I'm talking about. "This is Us" is one of those shows that tugs at the heartstrings and sometimes rips them apart. There are very few shows out there that seem to accomplish what this show can do. It explores topics in an authentic way that is relatable and real. They dive into family systems, broken relationships, alcoholism, adoption, racism, divorce, death. Like I said, real topics.

The show follows the Pearson family and it jumps back and forth between timelines, from present day, when the three Pearson children are grown, all the way back to when their grandparents were young and everything in between. The writers weave these timelines together and show how generations affect one another.

One episode in particular hit me on a strong emotional level. If you haven't seen the show, I'll try not to give too many spoilers, but apologies if I reveal too much.

The episode that brought on perhaps the ugliest of ugly tears for me was the one where Randall, the adopted Pearson child, ventures back to Memphis with his birth father, William. Their relationship is complicated. William gave Randall up when he was a newborn because he was addicted to drugs and not able to raise a child. And so Randall didn't meet his birth father until just a few months before this trip to Memphis. William was dying from cancer. And his time with Randall was cut short.

In the next episode, William's wishes are carried out as his two granddaughters, Randall's daughters, get to plan his funeral. They decide a sad and dreary service wouldn't fit William, and so they plan a (fun)eral, complete with karaoke, good food and lots of laughs. They even wear old man hats as they stroll down the street where he used to walk each day.

Instead of a eulogy, they instruct their dad to give a toast. But, he realizes it would be more appropriate for his wife, Beth, to speak. Since she was the one who spent the most time with him and was perhaps the most impacted by his presence.

What I love about this toast, is that Beth names the unfairness that our time with each other is often too short. William entered their lives and brought with his brokenness and painful story. Randall had to sort through the emotions of his father abandoning him. William was recovering from his addiction, which added more tension. It was difficult to have him living in their house. But as they learned to be a family, Beth grew to love her father-in-law. She went from being angry at him and skeptical of him, to feeling thankful for the tremendous impact he made on their family in the short time he lived with them. She sees it as a blessing that he remains part of their fabric. Forever part of their story.

I would imagine we can all relate to Beth Pearson as she delivers this speech. We all understand what it is like to lose a loved one. And to lose that loved one before we are ready. It seems one of those cruel aspects of being human is that our time with one another is just too short. Whether they are lost to tragedy. Or whether they get to live to be 90 or even 100. As a hospice chaplain, I've learned never to assume that the family of elderly patients will cope better than those losing young loved ones. Even if our loved ones live good long lives, it can be so hard to say goodbye.

But one of the ways we can find comfort is by intentionally remembering those loved ones after they've gone. Holding on to the memory of them. And remembering the legacy they've left behind.

On All Saints' Day we take the opportunity to honor those who remain part of our fabric, regardless of how much time we had with them. This day is a time to remember and reflect.

Way back in the early church, All Saints' Day was a day to preserve the church's memory of the martyrs who's lives were given for the sake of the Gospel. There was no list of those martyrs written down anywhere. They didn't have a Session log keeping track of baptisms and marriages and deaths. And so they had to say those names out loud to ensure the memory of them was not lost. The names of the saints were preserved through this practice.

Jumping forward more than a thousand years, the Reformation brought about many changes to the church, including the understanding of what it means to be a saint. The Reformers understood that anyone who is baptized in Christ has been declared righteous by grace. And therefore, all baptized believers are holy ones, as the apostle Paul says. Or, to put it another way all baptized believers are saints. In God's eyes, each one of us is a saint.

As we look at our text for today, the Beatitudes, we see that ordinary people, now deemed saints through Christ, have been tasked with fulfilling God's dream of love and justice in the world. Ordinary, even broken people, are called to do God's work.

As Jesus preaches up on that Mountain, he reverses what the world holds to be true. The world would say that those who are special. Those who hold some unique talent. Those who are wealthy and famous. The world would say that those people are the ones who are blessed by God. It seems logical. They've got it made, right? Look at their fortune and comfortable lives! It must mean that God favors them. That God has a special blessing for them. That they have somehow earned their blessings on this earth.

But Jesus turns that logic on its head. Jesus declares that those who are poor or marginalized or downtrodden. Those who have been treated unfairly. Those who have worked tirelessly to bring peace and mercy to others. Those are the ones for whom God holds particular favor. God sees them and God loves them. And God honors them.

Dr. Margaret Aymer, professor of New Testament over at Austin Seminary, wrote a wonderful study on the beatitudes for the Presbyterian Women's Horizon's Bible Study a few years ago. I have fond memories of studying it with the circle of women in this church while I served as a seminary intern. In Dr Aymer's interpretation of the text, she uses the phrase "greatly honored" instead of blessed. In doing so, she broadens our understanding of what Jesus means. That's God's response transcends the here and now. That's God's response to us will resonate in the halls of the Kingdom of God.

God holds a special honor for those suffer. A special honor for those who are cast out by the world. A special honor for those who will not remembered in the history books, or praised for their accomplishments on earth.

If you're like me, most of the people you are thinking about on this day aren't the ones who made headlines. They aren't the ones who were known throughout the world. They were the ones who lived ordinary lives and, perhaps, broken lives. As I think about the saints I met through the church, I recognize ways that they lived into the call the Jesus presents in the Beatitudes.

The saints who stand out in my mind are the ones who displayed humility and meekness. They are the ones who recognized the injustices of the world and worked to change the world. They are the ones who resisted and persisted when the powers that be tried to knock them down.

These saints emulated Jesus in his humility and work for justice and mercy. And these saints have given us an example for how to live. Those saints have presented us the challenge to live in a way that reflects the Beatitudes. Reminding us that we are called to do as Jesus does and live as Jesus lived.

On this All Saints' Day, we can give thanks for those saints who have gone before us. The ones who have been the people Jesus talks about in the Beatitudes. God honors those saints from every time and place. Especially those who suffered for being who they were or doing what they did for the sake of the Gospel.

We can give thanks that we have all been woven in to be part of God's fabric. Knit together by the Holy Spirit as the communion of saints. Thanks be to God. Will you pray with me:

Blessed are you, O God, for you are holy, gracious, and good, the hope of all the faithful. Empower the meek and encourage the poor. Comfort those who mourn and fill humble hearts with gladness. Give food to the hungry, drink to the thirsty, peace to the peacemakers, mercy to the merciful, and honor to the despised. Sustain your saints in ministry, until at last they see their reward: the joy of eternal life with you; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.


