Please, pray with me-

Wellspring of eternal life, we come to you this day having drunk deeply the waters of anxiety and despair. Bring to us your living water. Quench our thirsting souls, for we offer this prayer in Your name. Amen.

Thank you, Caly, Vernon, young men and women, and members of our congregation for bringing the Word to life in our dramatic presentation of **John 4: 1 – 42.** 

You all know I'm a fan of Sesame Street; and, that messages are sometimes presented by letters of the alphabet. This morning, we will discover highlights represented by "D," E," and "F," – but not necessarily in that order!

This story is familiar, although it will only be found in the Evangelist's gospel...Matthew, Mark, and Luke missed this peculiar conversation that only John shares with us. Although the discussion is fairly straightforward, there is metaphor, types/shadows, and a parable tossed in for good measure, within these 43 verses. It is peculiar for many reasons.

- Jesus is speaking one-on-one with a woman a Samaritan woman!
- It's the longest dialogue Jesus has with ANYONE recorded in the New Testament
- What in the world was Jesus doing in Samaria, in the first place?

If you spend any time with Professors Park, Cuellar or Johnson over at Austin Seminary you learn a bit about culture, history, the context of male/female interaction, and ethnic friction in the Ancient Near East. For Jewish men, to speak with women, especially in public, was considered a direct route to Gehenna – not Hades, not Sheol – but Gehenna, the eternal home of evil people! The Samaritans were hated by the Jews, despite being somewhat not-so-distant cousins. Generations before, the Northern kingdom of Israel was conquered by the Assyrians – the conquest resulted in ethnic and religious mixtures. Samaritans only used the Pentateuch – the first five books of the Bible, so they did not have access to poetry, prophecy, and history the Jews based in Jerusalem used at the time. They sometimes referred to Samaritans in the mean-spirited term of 'half-breed.' The conflict between Jews and Samaritans was violent; and, the destruction of the temple on Mt. Gerizim by Jews in the south is just one example.

So, Jesus is on the run, taking a short cut from Galilee to Jerusalem. There are followers – (oh, there's the "F" word, I warned you they would be out of order) some of them seeking to witness miracles and to hear messages of hope. Others, like the Pharisees, Sadducees, and Scribes are getting nervous in the service, they are concerned that this new Rabi is upsetting the status quo; and, their lock on power and prosperity is at risk. The short cut through Samaria is typically avoided at all cost. Travelers would take a long route west, cross the Jordan river, go south, then cross the river again – all in an effort to stay away from Samaria.

It's hot. Jesus is thirsty. And, the well has water. The New Living Translation cites verse 10 like this: "If you only knew the gift God has for you and who you are speaking to, you would ask me, and I would give you living water."

If only.... if only

Living water...and, at first, she doesn't 'get' it. She just wants to keep from having to come to this well, in the middle of the day, avoiding the whispers and chatters of mostly other women, gossiping about me and worried about whether I'm after their man, next. She's tired of getting "the look" – single ladies, you know that not-so-pleasant glance you suffer if you get too close; and married women you know how to give it when someone gets a little too familiar with your man.

She's (the woman at the well) physically bound in a relationship of obligation

She's emotionally bound by ostracization and isolation

She's spiritually bound by ethnic and religious strife and confusion

THEN SHE MEETS JESUS!!! She is sitting at that well LEARNING — A DISCIPLE (there it is, the letter "D."!)

Jesus, who offers her a gift...not just wanting to take something from her.

Jesus, who has a REAL conversation with her, offering relationship...not just responsibility

Jesus, who gives her hope for redemption, not condemnation for her very being.

All of this, in a drink: living water, representing the Holy Spirit!

So, now I am asking, as reflected in the title of this message: "What are you drinking?"

WATER IS LIFE, AGUA ES VIDA...the liquid kind; and, the spiritual kind.

Jesus, the Messiah, the anointed one, came to bring Good News to the poor. He proclaims that the captives will be released, the blind will see, and that the oppressed will be set free.

And, I declare that if you drink from the well of living water that Jesus gives TODAY, you can bear the fruit of that spirit, listed in Galatians 5: 22 -23: love, joy, peace patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Not only that, that Spirit abides to guide you, comfort you, correct you. How can you not be excited about going all over, just like the Samaritan woman at the well (E – the first EVANGELIST), and tell EVERY-BODY you know...that you've met man! Living water, it's gift, take drink; and, share!


### **Closing Prayer:**
