


<u>Philippians 3:4b-14</u>

<sup>4b</sup>If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; <sup>6</sup>as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless. <sup>7</sup>Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. <sup>8</sup>More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have because of the loss of all things and I regard them as rubbish in order that I may gain suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ <sup>9</sup>and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. <sup>10</sup>I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, <sup>11</sup>If somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead. <sup>12</sup>Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own.

13 Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, 14 press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

"He will put those wretches to a out of the vineyard, and killed him. 40 Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants? 141 They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time."<sup>42</sup>Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the scriptures: 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes'? <sup>43</sup>Therefore I tell you, the kingdom of God will be taken away from you and given to a people that produces the fruits of the kingdom. <sup>44</sup>The one who falls on this stone will be broken to pieces; and it will crush anyone on whom it falls."<sup>45</sup>When the chief priests and the Pharisees heard his parables, they realized that he was speaking about them. <sup>46</sup>They wanted to arrest him, but they feared the crowds, because they regarded him as a prophet.

In the text we hear Jesus talking about stewardship to folks who were called to be representatives of him and to use their gifts for the glory of God. Every now and then we'll take a gift that God has given to us and think that because it's ours, it's mine, I can do what I want to do with it and live according to my own prerogative. And I'm hoping that there are some lessons we will learn from life, some lessons from the Word of God, from this parable, and hopefully a little something from this sermon. Our title is "Harvest Time: Producing Fruits," and I want to lift up Stewards, Stumbling Blocks, and then Strategies.

<u>Stewards</u>: <sup>33</sup>"Listen to another parable. There was a landowner who planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a wine press in it, and built a watchtower. Then he leased it to tenants and went to another country.

Jesus was saying the parables to some church leaders, who understood it was their call to maintain the foundations of faith, the truth; and even in doing so, they had issues with Jesus because they questioned whether or not he was who he said he was, and whether or not this new thing that was going was in line with the Scriptures. And in the process of doing the work, they did a great job in seeing what was right and wrong with everyone else but themselves. Every now and then we can do that also, can't we? We can see the little speck in someone else's eye, but oh, we can't even begin to deal with that plank in ours. And Jesus was saying, "We need to have a little talk."

<u>Stewardship.</u> We look at the text, the landowner, the one who provides, and we're going to identify that landowner with God. You know how the landowner buys the property, gets all the plants for the vineyard, gets the wine presses set, puts a fence around it, and builds a watchtower. Everything is set, and then the landowner leases it to the tenants. The landowner will get some of the produce and get paid, and the tenants will get paid—sounds like a winwin, doesn't it?

But somewhere along the way, there was a change of heart. The blessing became a burden. Instead of worshiping or appreciating the one who provided, it became about works righteousness. That's why the Philippians text is important here. Our righteousness is not bound in what we do; it's in who Christ is. His righteousness becomes our righteousness, and when we get that, it helps us to do what we're supposed to do as God's stewards.

And so if we're not careful, we can start despising the gifts that God has given us, devaluing them. It hasn't changed. We have. I still remember, and I'm thankful for little emails that come through every now and then, about that couple that was in the truck, and as they were driving on down the road, the woman says, "Baby, what has happened to us?" We used to drive and you'd hold my hand and cuddle up next to me. What happened to us?" And the man says, "Well, baby, I haven't changed positions. Still driving, still going down the road the way I've always gone...." We look at each other and say, "What have you...?" "Why have you...?" And we don't look at ourselves and say "Why have I...?" and "What have I have done?" And start despising the gift. In this case, they despised the one who gave. When it was harvest time, the landlord sends his tenants to go to the other tenants for the harvest. And what do they do? Beat him up, kill him. Well, maybe I'll send my son; they'll respect my son. And what did they do? They said, "Hey, if we take him, we can get his inheritance." Really? You think you'll kidnap the landlord and get the inheritance? By definition that's not possible!

The crazy thing for us is that God already made us co-heirs with his son. We already had the inheritance! And sometimes we're so busy fighting for what we already had that we missed sight of the gift that we had. We need to chill, receive the gift, appreciate the gift, and not get so caught up with life and so caught up with everything else where everyone else says, "You've gotta have this" and "You've gotta have that in order to be whole." No, I'm holding Jesus. And where I'm incomplete, the Lord is still working through me. I am the Lord's workmanship, and God is going to complete the work. Amen? <u>Stewardship of the things that we have, stewardship of the people who are part of our lives, and stewardships of these bodies. Don't despise it. Don't despise it. Rejoice in it. Rejoice in it.</u>

There are times in life that we will suffer. I don't like to suffer; I run from it. It can easily become a stumbling block. I tell most folks when there's a challenge going up, my rump is like a 90-degree angle, in the corner, backed up, trying to avoid it. Saying, "Lord if I can avoid this, I'm going to." And then I get mad—"God, why would you allow this to happen? If you had the power to keep this and keep that, then why?" Then I went back to the Word of God and see that there are things that sometimes happen out of hardship and suffering. Sometimes out of hardship and suffering, we hear from 2 *Corinthians 7:9-11:* 

<sup>9</sup>Now I rejoice, not that you were made sorry, but that your sorrow led to repentance. For you were made sorry in a godly manner, that you might suffer loss from us in nothing. <sup>10</sup>For godly sorrow produces repentance leading to salvation, not to be regretted; but the sorrow of the world produces death. <sup>11</sup>For observe this very thing, that you sorrowed in a godly manner: What diligence it produced in you, what clearing of yourselves, what indignation, what fear, what vehement desire, what zeal, what vindication! In all things you proved yourselves to be clear in this matter."

Instead of seeing suffering as a denial, we see God using it to help develop leaders. What are you stumbling blocks or those things keeping you from giving your All to the Lord?

Stumbling Blocks: <sup>40</sup>Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?" <sup>41</sup>They said to him, "He will put those wretches to a miserable death, and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will give him the produce at the harvest time." <sup>42</sup>Jesus said to them, "Have you never read in the scriptures: 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; this was the Lord's doing, and it is amazing in our eyes'?

See, we have a choice. When the storms of life come, when the moments of suffering come, when the moments of sorrow come, we could say, "I'm through with you, God, and I'm through with life!"—and turn our back to it. But in that *Corinthians* text, Paul says you went through, and it led to a change of heart, it led to a repentance; and in the end when all of that took place, you came out of it innocent; you came out of it better. In the *Philippians* text, Paul says, "I want to identify with the Savior in his suffering and the resurrection"...because when you think about what Jesus bore for us, leaving divinity for us, getting the beatdown for us, having folks talk about him for us, and then we think of what we're going through, we're like "Oh...He knows." But then you can say, "Okay, so am I supposed to just take the beatdown?" No, you're supposed to look for the resurrection because there is where the victory is.

He got up so we can get up. Because he lives, I can face tomorrow.

Stumbling blocks will always be before you. In the text, the leaders are struggling with Jesus' identity and are suspicious with regards to his intention. Jesus wants to let them know that they have created a stumbling block, which has kept them from recognizing him as Messiah and their stewardship of God's resources would call them to include rather than exclude others.

As we hear the people respond to Jesus, we hear their judgement and also the judgement they expect from the landowner. The result of the tenants beating the landowner's servants and son would be their destruction; however, Jesus says, "Whoa, hold up, have you not read, have you not heard?" He says that the stone that the builders rejected is the cornerstone.

Jesus is using Old Testament scriptures to help set up something....The Old Testament lets you know in *Daniel 2 that there were powerful nations on the earth, which impacted Israel.*

All of these powers were represented in a statue from King Nebuchadnezzar's dream. At the end of the day, it was the stone, representing the Kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, hued out, would crush those powers. And what's important for us to know is that he would rule and reign over all things and that he indeed is the King of kings and Lord of lords. We need to know that, because there are sometimes when we are battling, and we think, "Lord, are we winning this fight?" And the Lord says, "Yeah, we are, just chill. You line up and let's go do this thing together."

Jesus also lifts up **Isaiah 8**: <u>Isaiah 8:14-15:</u> <sup>14</sup> He will be a holy place; for both Israel and Judah he will be a stone that causes people to stumble and a rock that makes them fall. And for the people of Jerusalem he will be a trap and a snare. <sup>15</sup> Many of them will stumble; they will fall and be broken, they will be snared and captured."

The leaders needed to be reminded that the prophet told of the people either finding sanctuary and security in the Messiah or that he would be as stumbling block to them. Even as the darkness was prevalent in chapter 8, in chapter 9 there was more hope. The image of a stumbling block could be that of a stone.

There are different ways we can think about a stone. There's a stone that you can use to grind up some stuff so you can make a tortilla, something to eat. There's a way you can take a couple of stones like David and take down a giant. There's a way you can take a stone and hammer a nail. There's a stone as you go down a path that you can trip over. Or you can take a stone and build a foundation.

Jesus was supposed to be that foundation. Unfortunately, the ones who were called to maintain the the foundation were tripping over it the Messiah, who they were supposed to recognize as their hope. In Isaiah 9, our master and Messiah is recognized as **Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Eternal Father, and the Prince of Peace**. But they didn't get it. As a matter of fact, they realized, "Oh, he's talking about us!" And they had problems. I'm going to let you know, instead of them saying, "Oh, he's talking about us so I'd better get my life together"... "Oh, I'd better follow him"....they wanted to try to kill Jesus just like the tenants in the parable.

They felt judged, and they responded with violence. There are times when we feel judged, and in the west, we say, "You're not supposed to judge." Guess what? All of us judge.

Most of the time when we say don't judge, it's because we want to live by our own prerogative. We want to do what we want to do, and we want you to stay out of our business. I judged whether I was going to wear khakis or black this morning...a burnt orange shirt or red. And you know I struggled with wearing red with the big Texas OU game coming up next week, but I'm on fire for Jesus today, so I put on the liturgical Pentecost red. We all judge!

I tell you, there are people who speak into my life, and I judge them to be the right people to speak into my life, because they've judged me, and they've judged me for the best to get out of me so I can best steward this and this that God has called me to steward over. So yes, I need some folks to judge, to see some things, but don't let it be a stumbling block. Let it be a pathway to clear up so you can do great and mighty things for the Lord.

Finally, in the movie "Jeremy Maguire," Cuba Gooding, Jr. was talking to Tom Cruise and he said, "Show me the money." This old sophisticated sports agent wasn't going to say, "Show me the money." and he was going to have to come out of his shell and say it in order to keep his job. Cuba was making him come out of his shell to prove he really wanted the job. That was his strategy. And you're thinking, "Where's the strategy in this sermon?

The strategy is, our God relentlessly pursues us. We think we came to the Lord....The Lord has been coming after us with loving arms, "Come on, baby!" for the long haul. The Lord has been making provisions for us, the Word of God says, since before the foundations of the world. The Lord's strategy is to prove to be faithful even when we are faithless. We are here today because of the faithfulness of God. We have overcome hardships because of our faith and God's faithfulness. It is as though God says, "I'm going to be faithful. Because I know one day they are going to get it, and when they get it, they're going to appreciate it, and we'll be in relationship."

That's the strategy of God. Even to the point that God said, "I will empty myself of my divinity and become like a babe. That's what our God does. That's the strategy of God. Not to use power and might to make right, but to let love, and mercy, and grace abide....not to back-stab, but to bring forth blessings. That's what our God does.

This world would say that strategy is not going to work. I'm going to let you know he started out with 12 disciples, and the number has grown and grown. You may say, "Look around, I see darkness." Okay, but I hope you'll start looking for the dawn. That's what happened in *Isaiah*. Look for the dawn. God is still at work. God is alive; God is not dead.

Trust the Strategist—the strategy of God to do something. Don't trust in yourself, in your position, in your power or your prestige. Paul said, "I counted all my credentials as dung, as rubbish"—Why? Because he knew our credential could get in the way of our commitment to God. He also could hear the words from Isaiah 64:6: All of us have become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous acts are like filthy rags; we all shrivel up like a leaf, and like the wind our sins sweep us away.

When we come before this holy and righteous God, we can't come on our own merit. God made provisions for us through Jesus. When we go before the throne of God, our righteousness is in Christ Jesus. He enables us to come before God with the right spirit, the right heart and mind, and to be in the right place to be used by God. What happens if I am still lacking? God will still use you and give you a testimony, which blesses others.

As I close out, you may say, "Where's the producing of the harvest?" I'm glad you asked:

When we do the benediction, we say "May the love of God and the peace of Christ rest, rule, and abide." Abide. In *John 15* it lets us know that we are the branches, and we are connected to the vine; and as those who are connected to the vine, we abide in him, and he in us. When we are connected, there is an overflow. The overflow is that of the Holy Spirit, and do you know what the Holy Spirit does for us? The Holy Spirit produces fruit. In *Galatians 5:22* it lets us know that there are fruit; and the fruit is this: "*The fruit of the spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.*" Whew! I'm thankful for the Spirit because when I try to produce all of the fruit, I fail. And I'm the pastor.

When the Spirit is at work, something else happens: Love, joy, peace, forbearance, bearing up under, helping when I don't want to help.

As we leave, I want us to hear the last part of that *Philippians* text.

There are some folks right now who didn't hear Paul. Paul said "I forget and then I strain." Forget what was done in the past and strain. Why would you strain if it was easy to do? You strain because it's hard. It's not easy, but you keep straining, keep struggling, keep working, keep pressing for the prize of the high calling. You might say "the calling" is just for the preacher, but no, you were called. You were claimed, and you were created for the purposes of God. My next question: Why would we experience everything on earth and then choose to quit and not get your prize? Does that make sense to you? Any of you going to work 40-60 hours a week and not get paid when you're expecting to be paid? So why run the race, quit and leave your crown of righteousness and glory waiting for you?

I have to remind us the race was not given to the swift nor to the strong but to the one who endures. There's a word called patience, and I have very little, but semblance of it is called "hupomoné:," and that is to bear up under the weight; and that's like squatting with a 45 pound bar on your shoulders, 45 pound weights on each side, and you taking it off of the safety rack. Immediately, you feel the impact of the weight bearing down on you. You gather yourself and start to go down. You can feel your knees shaking as you get to the point where you are supposed to start pressing up. It's a matter of mind and body. You make the decision and press up. Victory; however, immediately, you face the next battle when the next rep or challenge comes. You find yourself saying, "I can't do it, I won't do it, it's too heavy." But then you say, "No, yes I can," and you press up. I want you to keep pressing towards the high calling of God that is in you. Although I ddin't have a bar when I presented this example to you, I paused because I knew internally what this example would do to my heart, lungs, and legs; however, eternally, I knew God would take this illustration and do something amazing with it in your lives.

God, to You be the glory, praise, and honor for all that You have done and for all that You are doing, and all that You will do. Thanks for calling us to be Your stewards. Help us to start removing the stumbling blocks, and help us to realize when we have major stumbling blocks, that it's a call for us to change our hearts so that the blessings don't become burdens and we don't despise the gift or You for giving them to us. Finally, Lord, thank You for relentlessly pursuing us through Christ our Lord. Amen.




