





John 1/:20-20
<sup>20</sup> "I ask not only on behalf of these, but also on behalf of those who will believe in me through their word, <sup>21</sup> that they may all be one. As you, Father, are in me and I am in you, may they also be in us,<sup>[j]</sup> so that the world may believe that you have sent me. <sup>22</sup> The glory that you have given me I have given them, so that they may be one, as we are one, <sup>23</sup> I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me. <sup>24</sup> Father, I desire that those also, whom you have given me, may be with me where I am, to see my glory, which you have given me because you loved me before the foundation of the world. 25 "Righteous Father, the world does not know you, but I know you; and these know that you have sent me. <sup>26</sup>I made your name known to them, and I will make it known, so that the love with which you have loved me may be in them, and I in them."

I want to congratulate you. The spirit that I have witnessed here this morning, the joy and the love for one another, cannot help but be a tribute to your pastor, James Lee, and his visionary, faithful, loving, dynamic leadership. What delight he must feel and know in seeing your joy, in seeing your wholeness, in seeing your maturity in the midst of grieving. And I, for one, as one of his friends, am just delighted for him.

For most of us these past two weeks have consisted of days (and wrestling of night) of subdued feelings of deeper sorrow; of impatient questions; of remembrances and stories of love for James; and of the vision that James, with you and so many others, has carried so far. Did you see how far that vision has carried you, when you remember the amazing oneness and diversity of all those people who gathered last Tuesday at Shoreline for James' Service of Witness to the Resurrection? A living witness to James and the Holy Spirit's leadership at New Covenant Fellowship. It's amazing! (I'd like to write a letter to the editor to ask them why they didn't write a story about it!)

So we sense this morning in his fresh absence the Faith and Love that he represented to us and taught us; we sense the ties that bind us to him through Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit, and above all, we are thankful, are we not? We are also experiencing the tugs of the ties that bind all of us together—those present, absent, in the past, those surely to come, and those who were for a moment at least exposed to the Spirit and the Gospel for which this congregation has been marching.

# New Covenant Fellowship of Austin May 22, 2016— Trinity Sunday

The "oneness" we experienced in James' ministry – the remarkable differences in those whom James and this congregation have called together – is visible and palpable. We respond not only as to a death in the family, but, as Scripture reveals, with a movement or a call toward the oneness which God in Christ continues to call us: <sup>23</sup> I in them and you in me, that they may become completely one, so that the world may know that you have sent me and have loved them even as you have loved me.

You've heard a lot of words these last couple of weeks, and Trish tells me what a wonderful job Bill did preaching last Sunday (See Newsletter, May 21, pg. 7). So I would like to do something different with you today. I would like to invite you into my garden. Would you pick up the picture that I put in your bulletin this morning? My garden of Easter lilies. Timely, because only two of them are left. Whether you are a gardener or not, I would just like you to relax and stay with me in this garden for a few minutes.

Have you ever touched an Easter lily? They're tough, not fragile; these petals do not tear apart. And look at the grace of them, the sculpted beauty and length of the trumpet-shaped blossom. And they sit out in my backyard, but I thought they would never bloom! I kept talking to them every week: "Okay, guys, here's more food, now let's get with it!" But they only blossomed 10 days ago. Look at the picture. Remember Jesus' words about admiring the lilies of the field, they're not cared for except by God, the beauty of them...the wildness of them...the free-ness of them. What I like is the varied directions the blossoms face, while all belonging to a single plant, with one root. And that's what our text this morning is about: Oneness. I'd like to tell you a story about what oneness is *not* about:

When I was returning from service in Japan and Korea in the late '50's (after the Korean War), my friend John and I chose to return the long way to the U.S. through Asia and Europe. One day as we crossed from Holland into Germany, we saw a sign that the previous village was obliterated by bombing during the war and invited travelers to the new village five miles down the road. Travelling the five miles in a tiny car as two six-foot-four young men, we found no community, but only a two-story hotel. As soon as we parked and extricated ourselves with difficulty out of the little car, the owner came out wearing a tuxedo, to carry in our luggage and lead us up to our second-floor room. Minutes later, he returned to invite us down to the basement bar/restaurant.

Suddenly the sliding glass doors opened, and in came a German men's volleyball team, together since the war ended 11 years before, and all were amputees – each person missing at least a leg or an arm. They were in good spirits, and within a few minutes our tuxedoed host asked them if they would enjoy having two Americans join them and invited us to do so.

Within a few minutes, after warm introductions, they began to sing joyfully as they drank their strong German beer. Then one said it was time to dance. Dance? John and I looked incredulous but were soon on our feet. Have you ever danced with someone missing a leg?

A few minutes later one of the German soldiers said to me, "George, you fought the communists and we fought the communists; therefore, we are friends!" A common enemy tends to unite us again and again. No, we weren't friends, but to confirm this new friendship of the moment, we shook hands

You hear the echo of this in today's newspapers, in today's politics. It's not a love, it's not a friendship of those who are for one another, but rather of those who are against one another, in a way frankly I've never seen. You fight you, you fight for me, and then we'll be friends....

The Scripture in the eloquent voice of John calls for all of us to be one and sends Jesus among us, nurturing, helping, dying for all of us. The onemanship, this reconciliation. The one thing I admired from the beginning about James, and Trish quickly joining him, and all of you, is always the diversity that's been in this group, it's the oneness. It's not the togetherness because of being against someone; but it's the call of God to become one and to project and reach out in that oneness to everyone else.

Last week at James' service we witnessed the oneness...just the oneness, not separation, but oneness. You don't have to go in the Army. I never met a Jew until I went in the Army. I'd never met anybody who'd never brushed their teeth until I met a dozen boys from Chicago slums. I'd never met anybody from different countries. Some people think we need the draft again so we can have a more diverse community. No, that may be one result, but it's the Gospel, the way that you and I are so blessed and equipped to reach out in unity and in reconciliation and in oneness.

The oneness to which Christ calls us
and the oneness of the vision energizing James Lee
and this congregation
is not just the oneness of being for or against someone else,
not just friendship or seeking out relationships with people we like,
but a oneness to which God in Christ has called us
and which this congregation has demonstrated.

I think the diversity, the beauty, and yet the oneness of the plant that spawns this kind of Easter lily is something to lift up to our Lord, a cause for celebration...and next year I look forward to planting more of them to share with you.

Amen.
