


Dear NCFA Family and Friends:

As we prepare for the weekend, there are several things that I would like to highlight:

After worship this Sunday I would encourage you to please attend the session with Sherry Kenney. Hopefully, you will find it to be an opportunity to provide directions for your loved ones after you've entered the Church Triumphant and to learn how to leave legacy gifts. With the generosity of so many of Jane Mack's family and friends, we were able to fund a memorial plaque and cross. It is my goal to educate and equip us, not to introduce emotional dialogue.

We are being blessed by our friends Nancy and David, who have invested in a program that we will start soon. The initial grant will allow us to purchase several sewing machines so that we may teach individuals how to sew, add embroidery, and make alterations. These were part of the skillset taught in Home Economics classes and at the side of my grandmother when I was little. Whoever attends the course will need to write a letter to David and Nancy to express ways that they believe they can utilize the course for personal and professional advancement.

Our participation in "New Beginnings" is picking up momentum as Elders Caly Fernandez and Benton Hooks along with seminarian Matthew Aldas have begun training at Holy Trinity. We will offer small groups in the coming months so that as a church we can better prepare for our immediate future and the wonderful things yet to come.

While serving as one of the keynote speakers at the Multicultural Youth Conference, I am more aware why it is important for us to exist and to stay the course. Our young people need to be affirmed and to have their aspirations heard so that they know they are obtainable, but more importantly, realized.

As my children are discerning their own vocations, I realize how blessed I have been to have been taught by and to have learned from great leaders in my family, my churches, and my communities. It is my prayer that as disciples of Jesus Christ, we will learn from and invest in others so we will not allow polarizing powers to preclude us from being the very best that God has called us to be in our present and future context for life and ministry.



"David We Have Loved, but Jesus?"

2 Samuel 5:1-5, 9-10; Mark 6:1-13

2 Samuel 5:1-5, 9-10

When all the tribes of Israel came to David at Hebron, and said, "Look, we are your bone and flesh. ² For some time, while Saul was king over us, it was you who led out Israel and brought it in. The LORD said to you: It is you who shall be shepherd of my people Israel, you who shall be ruler over Israel." ³ So all the elders of Israel came to the king at Hebron; and King David made a covenant with them at Hebron before the LORD, and they anointed David king over Israel. ⁴ David was thirty years old when he began to reign, and he reigned forty years. ⁵ At Hebron he reigned over Judah seven years and six months; and at Jerusalem he reigned over all Israel and Judah thirty-three years. ⁹ David occupied the stronghold, and named it the city of David. David built the city all around from the Millo inward. ¹⁰ And David became greater and greater, for the LORD, the God of hosts, was with him.

Mark 6:1-13

He left that place and came to his hometown, and his disciples followed him. ²On the Sabbath he began to teach in the synagogue, and many who heard him were astounded. They said, "Where did this man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been given to him? What deeds of power are being done by his hands! ³Is not this the carpenter, the son of Mary and brother of James and Joseph and Judas and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?" And they took offense at him. ⁴Then Jesus said to them, "Prophets are not without honor, except in their hometown, and among their own kin, and in their own house." ⁵And he could do no deed of power there, except that he laid his hands on a few sick people and cured them. ⁶And he was amazed at their unbelief. Then he went about among the villages teaching. ⁷He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two, and gave them authority over the unclean spirits. ⁸He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. 10 He said to them, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. 11 If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them." ¹²So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. ¹³They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

Have you ever had a case of déjà vu? It seems that there are certain times that we feel we have experienced something more than once. I often experience this because I like to tell stories. The problem is that I often tell so many that I forget some of the stories that I have already told. One time within the last week I was telling a story to a friend of mine, and I was really passionate; but I noticed that he did not seem fazed at all about what I was saying. As I was coming to the end of my story, I realized that he was already anticipating where I was going, as if he already knew what I was going to say. So I stopped mid-sentence and asked him if I had already told him this before...to which he replied "Twice."

"David We Have Loved, but Jesus?" 2 Samuel 5:1-5,9-10; Mark 6:1-13

As I studied our lectionary text for this week, I felt like I was reading the same story twice. King David and Jesus of Nazareth appear to have much in common. Yet as we can see from our reading this morning, the way in which they are received by their own people is vastly different. Within the pages of *2 Samuel*, David is treated as if he is the fulfillment of God's plan all along. Jesus on the other hand did not receive the same warm reception from his kinsmen and women who were living in his hometown.

Looking first at our text from the Book of *Samuel*, our text this morning brings to completion a prophecy concerning David, foretold in *I*st *Samuel*, *Chapter 16*. It is here that David is first introduced and proclaimed to be the future leader of God's people. Contextually, Samuel has just been informed by God that King Saul is to be rejected, and that God will establish his own king from the lineage of Jesse, a shepherd from the town of Bethlehem. Now without going too deep into the *Book of Samuel*, it is important to first highlight some important aspects that are at play here. To begin with, the book of *I*st *Samuel* starts essentially with the end of what is known as the Judges period in the formation of Israel's history. Prior to King Saul, who was the first king over Israel, the tribes of God's people were ruled by a series of Judges, which can be read about in the book of *Judges*. The main theme to take away from this period was that it did not work. The Judges were not always faithful to God's covenant, and the theme of the Judges period is that "everyone did what was right in their own eyes."

So we now move into a period where Samuel is anointed as a prophet over all of Israel. He believes that his sons will take responsibility over Israel's people once he is gone. However, we can read in the 8th chapter that Samuel's sons were corrupt, and they did not follow in the ways of God, as did their father. So the people demand a king so that they may be like all the other nations. In his sorrow of the demands of the people, Samuel speaks with God, who informs him that they are not rejecting Samuel; rather they are rejecting God from acting as their true king. God relents and instructs Samuel to give the people a king after their own hearts.

Saul, it appears, was a natural choice to rule over Israel. The book of *Samuel* tells us that Saul was beautiful in appearance, wealthy, and stood "head and shoulders above the rest of Israel." Yet we soon learn that Saul is not a man after God's own heart; rather he is a person who resembles the heart of the people. Therefore, we see in the book that Saul is never really blessed by God because he is not the type of king that God has in mind. The people thought that because Saul was a mighty man from the people of Benjamin, people known for their superior skill in hand-to-hand combat and military campaigns, they had found their true messiah, the anointed one. But we see that God often looks at the inward appearance of people and sees their true character.

Before coming to seminary I worked at a bank in Dallas. I was a successful retail banker working in a new location in the heart of Downtown. Expectations were high for our branch because we were the furthest branch South, which meant that we would be servicing accounts for our corporate banking office and we would be responsible for any retail accounts in the surrounding residential areas. Primarily, I and one other banker were responsible for hitting the sales goals for the entire branch. Tommy and I had to hit the pavement a lot, and we had to try and make connections with people as often as we could. It is what we affectionately referred to as "hustlin"."

The two of us were brought there because of our track record of success in the retail establishment. We both had a way of connecting with people and seemed to be able to get new business. However, this branch was much harder for us, and we were really struggling. I remember coming into the office one day and Tommy's desk was empty, and there was a tech guy doing something on his computer. My boss called me into his office and let me know that Tommy was let go. It turns out that he was hurting so bad financially that he was stealing money from the company. I never would have thought that he would have resorted to that sort of behavior.

Now David, on the other hand, was much different from King Saul. He was a short, stocky, ruddy shepherd's boy who was so insignificant that he was out in the field tending the sheep when Samuel arrived to offer the sacrifice to the Lord in Bethlehem. When Samuel asked Jesse to see his sons, he was not even an afterthought. Surely Samuel would not want to concern himself with someone as minor as young David. And this is exactly the point of the text. God does not look at the outward appearance; rather, God examines the heart. And if you go and read *Chapter 16*, you will see that God chose David to be King.

Now getting back to *2 Samuel 5*. This is the culmination for Israel. God has brought David safely to this moment, and God has engineered events in such a way that David is the only rightful person to lead God's people, and to stand as King for both the people of Israel and God. David is the one in who God delights, and David is the one who will unify both the Northern Tribes of Israel and the Southern Tribes of Judah under one monarchy. We see that God takes a humble shepherd boy and uses him to lead God's people into their future. It is through the ministry of King David that God would choose to reveal Godself to the nations of the world. We can see and understand from the text that God was with David, and the people of Israel soon realized also that God was with David. And they chose to follow David because they understood that he was their anointed king. The one whom God chose.

Moving into our New Testament text, we see a similar picture with Jesus of Nazareth. He has come onto the scene proclaiming the kingdom of God and preaching a message of repentance. In the 5th Chapter of Mark we can read that Jesus displays his divine powers through three different miracles. First, he is able to heal the demoniac in the tombs who was possessed by a multitude of minions. Second, he is able to heal the woman who suffered hemorrhages of blood. Lastly, he showed his power even over death by bringing the daughter of Jairus back to life. All of this sounds pretty amazing. Can you imagine the scene? What if you were there? Would not seeing a demon-possessed man set free from his oppression, or seeing a women cease her suffering from never-ending blood flow, or even a dead person brought back to life cause you a moment of pause?

In our modern context we take for granted that we do not see the types of miracles that occur in the ministry of Jesus as normal events. But the reality of the matter is that neither did your average resident of the ancient Near East. Miracles in 1st century, 2nd temple Judaism did not occur with any sense of regularity. So when a wandering itinerant preacher showed up and started attacking the principalities and spiritual powers of darkness, people would have been amazed. The point is that the text has argued in favor of Jesus as God's anointed one. From the earliest portions of *Mark's Gospel*, John's proclamation of Jesus' superiority to his own ministry, to the Voice from heaven at Jesus' baptism, to the powers of the Kingdom that are so evident in Jesus' ministry. Had any of us been eyewitnesses to any or all of these occurrences, we would have been forced to conclude that there was something unique about Jesus, and perhaps God was with him.

"David We Have Loved, but Jesus?"

2 Samuel 5:1-5, 9-10; Mark 6:1-13

However, as we see in this text, Jesus is not treated in the same manner as David was. His kinsmen and women do not welcome him with open arms or validate him or his ministry. They do not praise God that one of their own has been chosen to liberate his people from oppression and injustice. There is no party or great homecoming during this reprieve. Rather, Jesus is essentially mocked and ridiculed. "Who is this one who is spouting all of this nonsense? He teaches as one who has authority and he keeps talking about God as if they are related!" The people were amazed at his teachings but not for the right reasons. They were amazed because they found his teachings to be scandalous. "Aren't you the bastard child of Mary? And don't we know all of your siblings?" This is not only a critique of his claim to be God's son but it was also an indictment against his mother. They were saying, "We know who you really are, and we don't buy your story. There is no way that God could be on the side of someone like you."

As I was putting this sermon together, I started thinking about a high-profile attorney from Dallas who was disbarred a few years ago. It turned out that he had represented hundreds if not thousand of clients in civil courts, until someone ran a background check and determined that he did not have a valid license to practice law because he never went to law school. He had lied about his credentials, and no one ever called him out on it. He had played the game so well that he was able to slide by. Sometimes your true identity has a way of casting a shadow over other people's claims. Your greatness is overshadowed by your past.

Unlike David, whom Israel loved, Jesus was mocked. Only a few people from Israel followed him, and he did not die in a manner worthy of any honorable person, let alone a king. We see from the way the gospel accounts end that God was with Jesus in spite of the people's unbelief. And unlike David, and even though all of the signs were there, the people from his town did not honor Jesus. It appears that the humility of his life and upbringing did not coincide with their vision of a coming messiah or the "Son of Man" from *Daniel 7* who would overthrow the Roman oppressors.

What is your "So what?"

If we do not know our history as recorded in both the Hebrew Bible and the New Testament, we might conclude that David was greater than Jesus of Nazareth. However, we know that this is not the case because we are aware of how the story of Jesus of Nazareth ends—being crowned the Lord of Glory and shown to be the Messiah of Israel and the entire world through the power of his resurrection from the dead. The point here is something that God said to Samuel concerning David. God looks at the heart and not the outward appearance. Jesus Christ who was lowly and rejected by his own people was exalted to the right hand of God our Father, and he rules in the cosmos until the consummation of all things takes place. David, on the other hand, started a chain reaction that led to the eventual exile of the Jewish people.





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Now when I think about how our text is applicable for us in the here and now, I think about our little church. I think about how we are a small and quirky bunch of people who often do not agree about anything. I think about the fact that financial constraints are a reality that we often have to face. But I also think about the fact that we love Jesus, and we love each other. And even though we are small, we are on the side of God, and that means that God is for us in Jesus Christ. It means that we are not "less than" another because we are not as big, flashy, or successful according to the world's standards. I think about the fact that Jesus Christ, the Lord over all of creation, was despised and rejected by his own people for not having the right background or look. I think about the fact that even when we may feel like we are too insignificant to make a difference for the sake of the Kingdom of God, Jesus said that faith the size of a mustard seed would move mountains.

I want us to walk away today recognizing a little bit more fully that we are worthy of the work of God in the world. While we may not be the biggest church in this city, God is on the side of the humble. And when you are in the world at work or at play, be aware of the fact that God is on your side. Recognize when you feel powerless to effect change due to your own limited resources or abilities that God moves and works through the humble. When you feel anxious or defeated by your limited knowledge or whatever may hinder you from making a difference for God's kingdom, remember that God is with the humble. Exalt in your own limited stature, for in doing so you show yourself to be in solidarity with Jesus Christ. May we look not at the outward appearance but always at the heart.
